The COVID-19 pandemic has taken a significant physical and psychological toll on Kentucky's children, youth, and families. The long-term impacts are yet unknown. Building and enhancing the system of care to address emergent and acute behavioral health conditions as well as taking preventative action to avert future psychological distress is more critical now than ever. Our system of care must respond. We must build our collective resilience - we are better together!

The System of Care Academy Planning Committee invites submissions of presentation proposals for Kentucky's eighth annual System of Care Academy. The 2021 Academy attendees will include primary care providers, clinicians, prevention specialists, educators, child care providers, Family Resource & Youth Services Centers staff, juvenile justice staff, family and juvenile services staff, community-based services staff, child welfare staff, public health staff, families, youth, interested community members, and people with lived experience.

To ensure diverse representation, we invite individuals and organizations from a variety of settings – including academia, non-profit, private sector, government agencies, healthcare systems, and provider agencies – to submit proposals for presentations focused on improving the system of care, improving policies, workforce development, original research or significant accomplishments in the field, including new frameworks, conceptual models, and methodological approaches.

Selection Criteria

- * Topic and objectives support and reflect SOC values and principles (see page 3)
 - Session content is unique and exciting and reflects our dynamic community
 - Topics are relevant and will be of great interest and benefit to attendees
 - Sessions are designed with clear, measurable, and achievable learning objectives leading to strong outcomes
 - Attendees are inspired to return to their community and implement what they have learned

System of Care (SOC) is defined as "a spectrum of effective, community-based services and supports for children and youth with or at risk for behavioral health or other challenges and their families, that is organized into a coordinated network, builds meaningful partnerships with families and youth, and addresses their cultural and linguistic needs, in order to help them to function better at home, in school, in the community, and throughout life."

The **Core Values** support all SOC efforts in being youth- and family-driven; community-based; culturally- and linguistically-responsive; and trauma-informed.

The **Guiding Principles** of the SOC support children, youth, and families in having access to:

- A comprehensive array of effective, community-based services and supports.
- A service planning process that is strength-based and individualized.
- Evidence-informed and promising practices.
- Services and supports that are delivered in the least restrictive, most normative environments possible.
- Partnerships with families and youth.
- Effective care management supports.
- Developmentally appropriate services.
- A continuum of behavioral health promotion, prevention, early identification, intervention, and recovery services and supports.
- A system that supports provider accountability and quality improvement tracking.
- Protection of their rights.
- Services and supports that are provided without discrimination.
